Education: Globe

In the Second Degree, the celestial and terrestrial globes have been adopted as symbols of the universal extension of the Order, and as suggestive of the universal claims of brotherly love. The symbol is a very ancient one, and is found in the religious systems of many countries, Among the Mexicans the globe was the symbol of universal power. But the Masonic symbol appears to have been derived from, or at least to have an allusion to, the Egyptian symbol of the winged globe. There is nothing more common among the Egyptian monuments that the symbol of a globe supported on each side by a serpent, and accompanied with wings extended wide beyond them, occupying nearly whole of the entablature above the entrance of many of their temples.

We are thus reminded of the globes on the pillars at the entrance of the Temple of Solomon. The winged globe, as the symbol of Cneph, the Creator Sun, was adopted by the Egyptians as their national device, as the Lion is that of England, or the Eagle of the United States. In the eighteenth chapter of Isaiah (V.I.), where the authorized version of King James's Bible has "Woe to the land shadowing with wings," Lowth, after Bochart, translates, "Ho! To the land of the winged cymbal, supporting the Hebrew to mean the sistrum, which was a round instrument. consisting of a broad rim of metal, having rods passing through it, and some of which, extending beyond the sides, would, says Bishop Lowth, have the appearance of wings, and be expressed by the same Hebrew word. But Rosellini translates the

passage differently, and says, "HO, land of the winged globe."

Dudley, in his Neology (p.13)says that the knowledge of the spherical figure of the earth was familiar to the Egyptians in the early ages, in which some of the temples were constructed. Of the round figure described above, he says that it should be called a globe, an egg, the symbol of the world was perhaps intended; and he thinks that if the globes of the Egyptian entablatures were closely examined, they would perhaps be found of an oval shape, figurative of the creation, and not bearing and reference to the form of the world.

Lodge of Research

What is a Lodge of Research?

A Lodge of Research is a group of Freemasons interested in the history and study of Freemasonry, and who by their contributions make it possible to publish and distribute the results of their studies and investigations. The Lodge gathers and disseminates, by discussion and/or publication, information primarily of historical character pertaining to the origin and development of Freemasonry and to the members who have contributed to its growth and development.

Who may join?

Any Master Mason. If living in Missouri

he may become an Active Member, if in another jurisdiction, he becomes a Corresponding Member, if any organization, library, or lodge desires to join they are considered Subscribing Members.

What does it cost to become a member?

No initiation fee. The fee to join as a member in the Missouri Lodge of Research is \$15.00. This fee is the same for the yearly dues. If you desire to become a endowed lifetime member the price is \$300.00. (As of January 1, 2009, the annual dues will go to \$20.00 and the Endowed membership will go to \$500) Membership in the Lodge of Research entitles you to receive the annual book published by the Lodge along with any other membership publications.

What are these funds used for?

Administrative costs, printing of Masonic Literature, Printing of the membership books and funding approved grants to Masonic Researchers. You may apply for these grants through the Secretary's Office located at 6033 Masonic Drive, Ste. B, Columbia, MO 65202-6568 or e-mail your request for information at rmiller@momason.org. There are no salaries given, however, the Secretary/Treasurer is voted an honorarium. Every penny of our funds is used for Masonic purposes and the enlightenment of the members.

How often does the Lodge of Research Meet?

Two times a year. The first meeting is during the York Rite Session in May of each year and the regular yearly meeting and installation is held during the Annual Session of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Missouri.
